THE SOLDIERS' TOWER CARILLON at 5:30PM
Carillon Student **MINAKO UCHINO**

The carillon is a musical instrument of bells in a tower. Carillon bells are cast in bronze and tuned such that they can be sounded together in varied chords with harmonious and concordant effect. The 51 bells of the Soldiers' Tower Carillon at Hart House, range in weight from 4 tons to 23 pounds.

The carillon played by a single performer from an organ-like console with batons and pedals, which are attached to wires that control the cast iron hammers, or "clappers". The clapper (there is one inside each bell) moves towards the inside lip of the bell when a baton/pedal is depressed – when the bell (which remains stationary) is struck by the clapper, a sound is made! Because the motion is completely mechanical, the carillonneur can control dynamic expression through variation of touch.

The Soldiers' Tower Carillon originally consisted of 23 bells cast by Gillett & Johnston. Alumni, students and friends of the University donated the bells in memory of students and graduates who fell in World War I. The dedication ceremony took place on October 6, 1927, during the University's Centenary Celebrations. After an additional 28 Petit & Fritsen bells were installed, the new 51-bell carillon was rededicated on May 7, 1976.

GAHU SONGS

Gahu is a recreational piece of the Ewe (eh-weh) people who live in Ghana and Togo, West Africa. Gahu is a rich texture of singing, dancing, drumming, drama and visual impact of colorful costumes. It originated in Nigeria and was brought to Ghana in the 1950s by Ewes who had travelled there. "Gahu" means "expensive dance" and refers to the elaborate nature of the costumes. The four songs in this orchestration (among many others) accompany the dancing and drumming of Gahu. The dance is performed in a circle. The percussion parts include ostinati rhythms from a double bell called a "gankogui" (gon-ko'-gee) and a gourd rattle called an "axatse" (a-hah't'-see). Over these sounds are interlocking drum patterns played by the standard family of Ewe drums, the high-voiced "Kagan", the medium "Kidi", the bass "Sogo", and the leader or master drum, the "Atsimevu". The drumming is renowned for the intricate complexity of its cross-rhythms and for the musical "call and response" which gives the performance something of the quality of a group conversation.

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Frederick Kwasi Dunyo was born in the Ewe village of Dagbemeté, Volta Region of Ghana, West Africa. He has been drumming from the time he was a small boy, standing on blocks to reach the top of the drums. Since that time he has drummed, danced, taught and directed extensively in a variety of contexts both in Ghana and North America.

Kwasi was lead drummer with Sankofa Dance Theatre for 1977 to 1981m under the tutelage of Godwin Agbeli. He has performed with numerous drum and dance societies in Ghana. Kwasi is founder and artistic director of Kekeli Drum and Dance Ensemble, Toronto as well as West African Cultural Exchange Centre in Dagbemeté, Ghana (affiliated with the Centre for National Culture). His open and generous style and great love of music has earned him many praises. He is an instructor in the Faculty of Music, University of Toronto.

He has performed and given workshops at many Canadian universities including the University of Saskatchewan, Guelph University, University of Waterloo, University of Western Ontario, McMaster University, and Brock University.

Minako Uchino began her music study at age 4 at the Yamaha School of Music in Tokyo, and began playing the organ at the Aoyamagakuin High School in grade 8. While attending Tokyo Women's Medical University, she played percussion in the school orchestra. After completing a residency in general surgery at National Tokyo medical Center, she trained as a radiation oncologist at Saitama Medical University Hospital. Currently she is studying medical education at the University of Toronto and serving as a radiation oncology clinical fellow at Princess Margaret Hospital. She began carillon studies with Roy Lee at the University of Toronto in September 2009.

Bruce Kidd is the Interim Warden and Hart House and is also a Professor in the Faculty of Physical Education and Health and a former Dean of the Faculty. In this capacity and throughout his career, he has been a leader in student engagement and student leadership. Bruce teaches and has written extensively, having authored or edited ten books and hundreds of articles, papers, lectures, plays and scripts. He is currently Chair of the Commonwealth Advisory Body on Sport; Chair, Maple Leaf Sport and Entertainment Team Up Foundation; and a member of the Selection Committee, Postgraduate Research Grant Program, Olympic Studies Centre, International Olympic Committee. Throughout his life Bruce has been involved in sport and recreation, whether in the Olympic movement, or in recent years, in international development through sport as one of the founders of Commonwealth Games Canada's International Development through Sport Program. Bruce has a long affiliation with Hart House, having participated in past Review and Advisory Committees for Hart House and the Warden and has served as a member of the Hart House Board of Stewards.

Donald Cole trained as a physician at the University of Toronto (1978). He then practiced primary care, public health, occupational health and environmental health in a variety of settings in Canada and lower and middle income countries. In a community medicine residency at McMaster University he completed a Masters in Design, Measurement and Evaluation of Health Services (1991), and went on to qualify as a Royal College fellow in Occupational Medicine (1990) and Community Medicine (1992). He developed a longstanding relationship with the International Potato Center around agriculture and health research for development, with a particular focus on pesticides, urban agriculture and nutrition. A Tri-Council Eco-Research fellowship in environmental epidemiology and the role of Interim Director of Research followed by Senior Scientist at the Institute for Work & Health fostered a focus on research.

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As a tenured Associate Professor and Interim Head of the Global Health Division at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto, he currently teaches, mentors, and contributes research evidence to public health practice and policy, with a developing interest in global health research capacity development evaluation. He is Director of the Collaborative PhD Program in Global Health and co-chairs the Capacity Development Program area of the Canadian Coalition for Global Health Research.

Susan Cole is a playwright, author and editor. Her two books *Pornography* and *the Sex Crisis and Power Surge* are essential books on the subject of violence against women (both from *Second Story*) and her play, *A Fertile Imagination*, was a groundbreaking work about two lesbian trying to have a baby. She recently published *Outspoken* (Playwrights Canada Press), a collection of lesbians scenes and monologues from Canadian plays. She is the Senior Entertainment Editor at *NOW Magazine* and can be heard every Thursday morning at 9 am on Talk Radio 640's Media and the Message panel.

d'bi.young anitafrika is an internationally celebrated afrikan-jamaican-canadian dubpoet, performer and educator. currently on a 15 month global tour her first stop is in toronto where she is starring in the *sankofa trilogy* at tarragon theatre, playing to rave reviews until december 4th 2011. The published author of two collections of poetry, eight plays and six dubpoetry albums d'bi. moves between uk, toronto, uk and cape town where she is curator of badilisha poetry and artistic director of the YEMOYA international artist residency

Stephen Lewis is the chair of the board of the Stephen Lewis Foundation in Canada. He is a Distinguished Visiting Professor at Ryerson University in Toronto, and he is co-founder and co-director of AIDS-Free World in the United States.

Mr. Lewis is a member of the Board of Directors of the Clinton Health Access Initiative and Emeritus Board Member of the International AIDS Vaccine Initiative. He also serves as a Commissioner on the newly formed Global Commission on HIV and the Law, created by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) with the support of the Joint United Nations Programme of HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS).

Stephen Lewis' work with the United Nations spanned more than two decades. He was the UN Secretary-General's Special Envoy for HIV/AIDS in Africa from June 2001 until the end of 2006. From 1995 to 1999, Mr. Lewis was Deputy Executive Director of UNICEF at the organization's global headquarters in New York. From 1970–1978, Mr. Lewis was leader of the Ontario New Democratic Party, during which time he became leader of the Official Opposition.

Mr. Lewis is the author of the best-selling book *Race Against Time*. He holds 34 honorary degrees from Canadian universities and in June 2010 he received an honorary degree from Dartmouth College in the United States. In 2003, Mr. Lewis was appointed a Companion of the Order of Canada, Canada's highest honour for lifetime achievement.

He was awarded the Pearson Peace Medal in 2004 by the United Nations Association in Canada; the award celebrates outstanding achievement in the field of international service and understanding. In 2007, King Letsie III, monarch of the Kingdom of Lesotho (a small mountainous country in Southern Africa) invested Mr. Lewis as Knight Commander of the Most Dignified Order of Moshoeshoe. The order is named for the founder of Lesotho; the knighthood is the country's highest honour.

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MTCC, SOUTH AFRICA

Sunelle Fouche

Music Therapy Community Clinic, South Africa

"Our work over the past 10 years has strengthened my belief in the power of music to highlight and enhance the resilience of some of Cape Town's most vulnerable children and young people."

A music therapist by training, Sunelle co-founded the Music Therapy Community Clinic (MTCC) in 2002 with her colleague and friend, Kerry Torrance. Based in Cape Town, South Africa, MTCC's vision is for children and young people to experience and generate hope and possibilities for their lives through shared engagements with music. Through a tight-knit team of music therapists, community musicians and community development workers, MTCC works with children and adults affected and infected by HIV and AIDS, as well as those who have endured trauma, abuse, neglect or abandonment or live in communities with high levels of violence.

MTCC's work includes an Early Childhood Development programme that provides weekly music therapy sessions for babies and young children at local hospitals and preschools. Their Music for Life and Youth Programmes help older children and adolescents to take initiative, express themselves, acquire musical skills and show respect for others by participating in African music groups, marimba and drumming groups and choirs.

In her current role as Executive Director of MTCC, Sunelle has been inspired and energized by her team's innovative thinking and commitment to bringing about social change through the use of music. She holds a Masters in Music Therapy from the University of Pretoria, and lives with her husband and young son in Cape Town.

Ronald Mzwanele "Zwai" Mvimbi

Music Therapy Community Clinic, South Africa

"I believe in reciprocity and that I should share my skills with young people. My work at MTCC has enabled me to give back to young kids."

For the last seven years, Zwai has worked with the Music Therapy Community Clinic as a community musician. Through MTCC's Music for Life programme, Zwai works with children in local homes, hospitals and day care centres. Using percussion, singing, gumboot dancing and playing instruments like marimbas and drums, the music therapy sessions provide an opportunity for children to be vulnerable and express their feelings in a safe space, bringing about a kind of healing that doesn't exist in other realms of their lives.

A marimba player and percussionist by training, Zwai holds a degree in African music from the University of Cape Town and has travelled and performed internationally. He began his musical career with the Community Arts Project (CAP) in Woodstock, Cape Town, in 1986, and went on to form a marimba and dance music group called Intsika-ya-Afrika ('the pillar of Africa'), with the aim of keeping children away from the lure of violence and gangsterism taking place in the community.

YHHS, ZAMBIA

Getrude Kamanga Sakala

Young Happy Healthy Safe, Zambia

"I know women have the potential and ability to bring tangible development and contribute to the reduction of poverty and the spread of HIV."

Getrude Sakala, 38, has been working with Young Happy Healthy Safe (YHHS) for five years, based in Chipata, Zambia. Founded in 2005, YHHS aims to reduce the spread of HIV and support those who are affected and infected by HIV and AIDS, with a special focus on youth aged 10-24 years. The organization works closely with tradi-

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tional leaders, rural health centres and the community at large to change harmful gender and cultural practices. Through their innovative drama groups – run by and for young people – YHHS addresses sexual and reproductive health, HIV/AIDS, violence against women, human rights and the importance of education.

With a background in project management, accounting and psychosocial counselling, Getrude is heavily involved in the day-to-day running of the organization. She frequently speaks about sexual and reproductive health issues to women in rural communities on behalf of YHHS. In addition to her role as the organization's Finance and Administration Officer, she works with YHHS' women's and grandmothers' groups in the Kasenga, Mnukwa and Nsajika districts, as well as with orphaned and vulnerable girls who are receiving primary school support.

Daphine Mugala

Young Happy Healthy Safe, Zambia

"I feel life skills are a necessity, especially for young girls who are vulnerable to rape, sexual harassment, teenage pregnancy and early marriage."

Daphine Mugala, 46, is a married mother of four and a teacher by training. In addition to her current role as a deputy school manager at Katintha Basic School, Daphine has been working with Young Happy Healthy Safe (YHHS) to develop materials on sexuality and life skills education in schools and has served as a trainer or teachers on sexual and reproductive health in Zambia's Chipata district for the last six years.

Through YHHS, Daphine works directly with young people in the district, providing life skills training and helping them make informed decisions about their sexuality and reproductive health. As a member of YHHS's board, she is also involved in helping to identify and arrange educational support and counselling for orphans and vulnerable children in the community.

Molly Johnson - Mother, Singer, Songwriter, Artist, Philanthropist

Molly has earned her reputation as one of Canada's greatest voices. She has rocked standing-room only audiences in nightclubs and bars from coast-to-coast as a pop artist, and seduced the patrons of salons and lounges with her luscious interpretations of jazz and blues standards.

She has regaled royalty during a private command performance aboard the Royal Yacht Britannia before the Prince and late Princess of Wales, as well as having performed for Nelson Mandela and Quincy Jones. She made history at the Toronto Downtown Jazz Festival, becoming the first Canadian female vocalist in the festival's 17-year-history to sell out a show on the mainstage.

Molly started the Kumbaya Foundation and Festival, raising awareness and over a million dollars for people living with HIV/AIDS. She continues to work with countless other charitable organizations every year. In 2008 she was honoured by the Governor General with becoming an Officer of The Order Of Canada.

On November 11th, 2008 Molly released her fourth full length album; a long awaited record of standards entitled LUCKY via Universal Music Canada & Universal Music France. LUCKY won the 2009 JUNO Award for Best Vocal Jazz Album. Molly also received the 2009 National Jazz Award for Best Female Vocalist.

Molly is the host of CBC Radio 2's weekend morning program. She lives with her husband and two sons in Toronto.

EVENT: Information session for the Namibia Internship Program 2012

Since 1997 U of T has been sending groups of students to Namibia to participate in 10-week long internships with various Namibian organizations and projects. Last summer, 10 students – from African Studies, Anthropology, Human Biology, New College, Pharmacy, Physical Education & Health - participated in the program from June to mid-August. They conducted a variety of service learning placements with six unique organizations in Windhoek (Namibia's capital city) and Oshakati/Ongwediva (in northern Namibia).

Participants from the Namibia 2011 program will talk about their placement experiences. In Windhoek, Laura Dekroon and Lindsay McCabe worked with Physically Active Youth, Niamh Fitzgerald and Sandra Godoy worked with the Namibia Women's Health Network and Heather Bannerman worked at the anti-retroviral therapy program of the Katatura Health Centre in Windhoek. In northern Namibia, Lisa Bauslaugh and Stephanie Kim worked at Communicable Disease Centre in the Oshakati Intermediate Hospital, Robyn Walter worked with the Disability Economic Empowerment Project and Abeer Ahmad worked at the Sam Nujoma Multi-purpose Centre in Ongwediva. Also, Shaun Musuka of Namibia 2010 will discuss his placement with the Small Business Development Centre in Oshakati.

Aaron Yarmoshuk, Director, HIV/AIDS Initiative – Africa, Global Health Division, Dalla Lana School of Public Health will introduce Namibia 2012 and provide an overview of the program. Professors June Larkin (Vice Principal, New College) and Ron Wilson (Interim Director, Human Biology) will be available to answer questions about next year's program and how to apply. Faria Marlatt, a recent Namibia Internship participant, U of T Alumnus and Project Coordinator for Namibia 2012 will also be on-hand to answer questions.

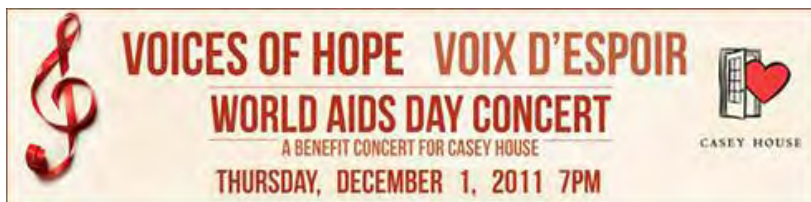
